MUM'S THE WORD

"...The grass withers, and the flower fades, but the Word of the Lord endures forever." That Word is the Good news that was announced to you.

I Peter 1:24-25 (NRSV)

Like many of you, I love the fall! I relish the cool autumn breezes and the spectacle of the changing seasons. From my back porch, I can see close by and far off in the hills, the mingling of green, gold and crimson leaves as they celebrate the memories of summer and the coming surprises of fall.

It is also football season. I love that, too. From home vantage point, I can hear the truly fine Dover High School band practicing and, at times, football coaches with their whistles and the players with their grunts, groans and shouts that accompany the rigors of a good practice.

What I don't like about the fall is all those colorful leaves will soon be on the ground. I hate raking leaves! Also, I do not like watching the flowers fade. I usually put a lot of time and effort planting and tending my flower beds. I enjoy the work and enjoy even more the colorful results. But, with the onslaught of fall, all that effort seems almost wasted and the joy diminished.

That's why I have a growing appreciation for the chrysanthemum (and my hardier geraniums). While the other flowers fade and fall away; in the fall, the mum is in all its glory. The autumn mum beautifies our gardens, fancies up our rooms and adorns the shoulders of our homecoming queens. It blossoms and boasts as if defying nature and time.

For you history buffs and learned horticulturists, chrysanthemums were first cultivated in China as a flowering herb as far back as the 15th century BC. The flower was brought to Europe in the 17th century. The renowned botanist Linnaeus named it from the Greek word *chrysous*, "golden" (the color of the original flowers), and *-anthemon*, meaning flower. They became immediately popular in the West and have remained a favorite of many ever since.

(On an aside: **Thank you, Mystery Mummer!** Whoever you are, thanks for the big and beautifully bright yellow chrysanthemums you anonymously placed in my big flower pots—all three of them. What an autumn blessing!)

Still, nothing lasts forever--even the mum. Mum's not the word by late November. By December they, too, will be faded, withered and covered with snow.

As old season changes into new season, there is only one thing that remains--always growing, always flourishing and always beautifying our lives with love and grace. That one thing is God's wonderful Word. Isaiah, and later Peter, reminded us of this glorious truth. With so much changing, so much fading, and yes, with so much death and decay; it is so good to know we have the life-giving constant of God's Word in our lives. It eternally refreshes. It eternally empowers. It eternally accomplishes God's purpose in us and for us.

Again, Isaiah reminds us: "For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, ¹so shall my Word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it." Amen and autumn blessings!

Since You Asked...

Since you asked...

Why did Jesus instruct us to pray "lead us not into temptation" when God states that He does not tempt us?



This is a frequently asked question. It seems I have encountered it several times in every one of my ministry experiences. I believe it requires a clear answer so that we may comfortably, sincerely and meaningfully pray as Jesus taught us to pray. I hope the following explanation will be helpful.*

First, we know from <u>James 1:13</u> that God does not tempt us to sin. If God did, He would be acting contrary to His holy nature and against His desire for us to be holy as He is holy (<u>1 Peter 1:16</u>). This would also contradict all other commandments in Scripture that tell us to avoid sin and flee temptation.

In the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13), Jesus included asking our Father in heaven not to lead us into temptation as one of the things we are to pray for regularly, along with forgiveness of sins, daily provisions, and seeking God's will, glory and kingdom. From this list, we can see that avoiding temptation should be one of the primary concerns of the Christian life.

The idea of God leading His people is a main theme of Scripture. The Psalms especially are filled with pleas for God to lead us in His ways (<u>Psalm 5:8</u>; <u>27:11</u>), by His truth and righteousness (<u>Psalm 23:3</u>) and in "the way everlasting" (<u>Psalm 139:24</u>). Along with leading us *to* good things, it is understood that we are asking God to lead us *away from* evil. This petition reflects the believer's desire to avoid, by God's grace, the dangers and consequences of sin altogether. Thus this petition can be prayed as "Lead us away from sin and temptation..."

This becomes clearer when we understand the goal of this petition is found in the second part of verse 13: "deliver us from evil." In other words, we are praying that God in His mercy would keep us from giving into temptation and, by so doing, protect, defend and rescue us from sin and its inherent and calamitous consequences. Here, Jesus teaches the important Gospel truth that God is our ultimate and only Deliverer from sin and death.

A petition similar to this is offered by David in <u>Psalm 141:4</u>: "Incline not my heart to any evil thing, to practice wicked works with the workers of iniquity." In this sense and in all things, God is our Deliverer and we are to pray to Him as such.



God has been doing some amazing things in the lives of the Moser family since we wrote you last. The whole family was together this summer... well... sort of. All four of us were in Schroon Lake, NY working at the Word of Life summer camps. Stuart and Kearstin worked at the Inn and Conference Center, and Steve and Tina worked at The Ranch and Ranger Camp.

When Steve and Tina returned from Bermuda (remember they were there for the entire month of May) they went straight to Schroon Lake for the annual Missionary Training Conference. And as soon as that finished, they began the preparations for camps. During the eight weeks of summer camp, they were privileged to be a part of the team that ministered to 2,038 children (ages 6-12), and 322 made the decision to receive Jesus Christ as their personal Savior. Praise God!

As you can see by the photos, the Word of Life Ranch was just that... a ranch. The boys and girls enjoyed the western theme, from the old west style Main Street to the horseback riding and even the weekly rodeo. As a part of the program staff we dressed the part nearly all the time. It was strange (and fun) getting up every morning and strapping on a six shooter.

Steve was asked to teach the morning Bible Hour lessons for the first two weeks, and he also taught some of the evening lessons each week. Tina had written a puppet script that we used each Monday night to help the children understand the verse of the day (Luke 10:27) and how they can love God with all their heart, soul, mind, and strength.

Moser Mission

The time Steve and Tina spent ministering in Bermuda has opened a new and exciting door. Steve and Tina have committed to join the team in Bermuda and concentrate their time and energy on children's ministry! The director of the ministry in Bermuda is also the regional director for all of Word of Life Caribbean, and so the plan is for us to join the team in Bermuda for two years, and at the end of that time, the decision will be made whether or not to remain there, or move out to a Caribbean country that is asking and praying for Word of Life children's ministry. There are currently Word of Life clubs in churches in countries where there is no Word of Life missionaries: Bahamas, Cayman Islands, St. Martin, etc.

Our main focus will be the strengthening and development of the Word of Life children's Bible clubs in the local churches... Olympian Clubs. There are currently five clubs in Bermuda and a new one starting this fall. Our role will not be to "run" the clubs in these churches, but to train and teach the children's workers in those churches to effectively disciple the children in their own churches.

Pray for the open door to work with the students in the public schools. Word of Life currently has lunch hour Bible clubs in two high schools, and after school clubs in three middle schools. Steve and Tina were privileged to share in some of those clubs back in May (see photos below).

Steve and Tina are praying to be in Bermuda this November. There is a mountain of paperwork to complete for a work visa, and the process could take up to eight weeks. Please pray it goes through quicker than that. Also, pray for Stuart and Kearstin as classes begin this week at the Bible Institute in New York. Stuart is looking forward to working with an inner city church on the weekends, and Kearstin is hoping to be a member of the drama team.


