Habby Easther!

Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. Luke 12:27

Alleluia! Achoooo! He is risen!

Gesundheit! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

As the ladies of our Altar Guild know, I am highly allergic to Easter Lilies. The flower's pollen stuffs up my nose and makes my eyes water. Those paschal posies make me sneeze!

That's why, with all their other Easter responsibilities, they remind me to "take my meds" before Sunday's first service. Currently, my drug of choice is Zyrtec. (Claritin works fine, too.)

I discovered this Easter syndrome while serving my first call to a parish in Ironton, OH. St. Paul was a much smaller congregation than ours with a much smaller and somewhat confined chancel area. Still, on Resurrection Sunday, it was filled with almost as many Easter lilies as we have here.

By the end of the Easter worship service, I was completely "pollinated." My eyes were swelling shut and my nose totally clogged. No fever! No chills! It had to be allergies.

And it was. Away from the sanctuary and away from all those lilies, I quickly recovered. But the next year, I was prepared and appropriately self-medicated.

Because of my holiday health issue, I've always wondered how all this Easter lily business started in the first place. Why not choose tulips or daffodils, hyacinths or some other lovely springtime bloom? I'm not at all allergic to any of those.

The lily has always been highly regarded in the Church tradition. <u>Jesus</u> Himself referenced the flower during his Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6:28-29) and His other teachings about worry and fear (Luke 12:22-34). Moreover, according to pious legend, "after <u>Jesus' death</u> and resurrection, some of these beautiful flowers were found growing in the <u>Garden of Gethsemane</u> and near His garden tomb."

In regards to its particular Easter symbolism, the **bulb** of these flowers buried in the ground represents the tomb of Jesus. The glorious, fragrant, **blooms** which grow from the bulbs symbolize His breaking forth from the grave and His life after death. The snowy **white color** stands for the purity of the Divine Savior and the joy of the resurrection. And, its **trumpet shape** signifies Gabriel's trumpet call to rebirth and new life in Christ.

Well, I've just completed my Biblical word search and there are no daffodils, tulips or hyacinths mentioned anywhere in Scripture. Lilies, however, are mentioned in both Testaments.

I guess, lilies it is this Easter and every Easter. Achoooo!

Allergies, hay fever and other sensitivities will persist and pester us until we celebrate our own resurrection and the eternal Easter of heaven. There, lilies will not be an issue. Any and every allergy is relieved. Any and every tear is wiped dry. (Revelation 21:4) And, I'm pretty sure you won't hear a sneeze anywhere.

Since You Asked

Since You Asked...

Grace Lutheran holds an Easter Egg Hunt each year. What is the origin and meaning of the Easter Egg?

Great question! I believe the Easter Egg represents our new life in Christ. But according to the religious writer at the **Huffington Post**, it can have an even deeper meaning in some Christian traditions. I've posted an excerpt below.

For Christians, the Easter egg is symbolic of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Painting Easter eggs is an especially beloved tradition in the Orthodox and Eastern Catholic churches where the eggs are dyed red to represent the blood of Jesus Christ that was shed on the cross. Easter eggs are blessed by the priest at the end of the Paschal (Saturday before Easter) vigil and distributed to the congregants. The hard shell of the egg represents the sealed Tomb of Christ, and cracking the shell represents Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Moreover, historically Christians would abstain from eating eggs and meat during Lent, and Easter was the first chance to eat eggs after a long period of abstinence. (Orthodox Christians continue to abstain from eggs during Lent.)

Easter egg hunts and egg rolling are two popular egg-related traditions. An egg hunt involves hiding eggs outside for children to run around and find on Easter morning. Eggs are rolled as a symbolic re-enactment of the rolling away of the stone from Christ's tomb. In the United States, the <u>Easter Egg Roll</u> is an annual event that is held on the White House lawn each Monday after Easter.

Hosanna! Hosanna! Here Comes Jesus!

Hosanna! Hore Comes Jesus! is this year's Vacation Bible School theme.

This year's Bible Stories and learning activities focus on Holy Week events, from Palm Sunday through Easter. Each day the children will learn a Hebrew word which captures the day's special meaning for our faith and life together. On Friday, we will celebrate our week's learning activities with a potluck supper and children's program.

VBS 2018 will be held June 18-22. A summer supper for children, parents and teachers will be offered at 5:30 p.m. Learning activities, including Bible Stories, crafts and recreation, begin at 6:05 and continue until 8:15.

A volunteer sign-up sheet seeking teachers, teaching assistants, activity directors and helpers is posted on the narthex bulletin board this month. Registration sheets for participating children will be printed in the May and June newsletters.

Note that this year's VBS Suppers are pre-prepared designed to "heat and eat." We are looking for volunteers who will heat and serve the evening's menu each evening.







Upstate New York SWO triples goal of 500 blankets, honors Katie Luther

The Upstate New York synodical women's organization tripled it's goal to sew or tie 500 blankets and quilts to honor the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and Katharina von Bora Luther.

At their synodical women's convention this past September, they celebrated the completion of their 500 Quilt Challenge for the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation with 1538 blankets and quilts.

Synodical president Susan Fox, Grace Lutheran Church, Oswego, N.Y., said the women from more than 30 congregations participated in the challenge.

"We had at least seven churches participate that do not have a Women of the ELCA group," Fox said. "We felt this was a great way to reach out and show our church where women are doing wonderful work."

The challenge honored the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in October 2017.

The women in Upstate New York look to Katie as a role model, especially for the care she took of the family home and business when her husband, Martin, was teaching and preaching, she said.

The SWO honored Katie through the quilt challenge because of her contributions to the Reformation movement, Fox said. After the quilts were counted and blessed, the SWO donated many of them to Lutheran World Relief.

Quilting Brings women together, said Judy Holmes of Atonement Lutheran Church, Syracuse, N.Y., one of the churches that participated in the challenge. Many hands were needed to reach the goal. Even if they couldn't sew, they were welcomed, she said.

"What a fun challenge for our quilting groups," Holmes said. "It's also an opportunity to

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In February, we distributed 111 bags, and have already distributed 90 in March. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. **Grocery size** paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


