Lent: to give up, to take on, or to Simply Live

Believe it or not, the season of Lent is already upon us and with it a call to examine our lives according to God's calling. Traditionally, Lent has for many included the discipline of giving up and taking on. People will be giving up everything from meat, sweets, and television to foul language, complaining, and procrastinating. Many more will take on spiritual disciplines of Bible study, worship, fasting, and prayer. But before we all get carried away with another task to accomplish or another vice to purge, let's stop and think about what we are really hoping to accomplish through it all. Or, even better, let's stop and ask God how He would want for us to grow in this season of Lent. The discipline of giving up and taking on isn't really about making life more difficult, but instead is about taking life back to the basics. We clear out the things that don't really matter, the things that distract us, confuse us, or leave us too worn out to focus on the things of life that really do matter. Lent's discipline is about returning (repenting) to a life that is full of God.

Where are you being pulled away from God? What in your relationship with God has suffered the most recently? How can you simplify your daily routine so that you can remember to simply live with and for God? These are the questions I hope we will all wrestle with as Lent approaches so that when Lent concludes we will have walked with Jesus along the way. We will have experienced the simple joy of being in Christ's presence. We will know that life as complicated as it seems so much of the time is truly as simple as trusting in the promises of God every day.

A popular John Mayer song says, “Oh, gravity is working against me and gravity wants to bring me down.” The apostle Paul says it this way in Romans 7, “For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate.” There’s a gravity to our human condition that separates and disconnects us from God’s intentions and purposes. In the season of Lent, we will walk with Jesus to the cross and examine the gravity of our own human nature; our sin and our self-focused desires. This journey will take us through Holy Week to Easter Morning—“Zero-Gravity.”

Sunday morning adult Bible Studies

Beginning with the First Sunday in Lent, February 10, there will be two fantastic options for adults to study the Bible together and grow in faith. Throughout this church year, the majority of the Gospel readings will come from the Gospel of Matthew, so during Lent you are invited to take an in-depth look at Matthew’s Gospel.

The J.C. Miller class which meets in the Luther Hall meeting room will be using a study entitled:

Matthew: The Passion Week

The last week of Jesus’ life—the Passion, the Crucifixion, and the Resurrection—is recorded at the end of the Gospel of Matthew. The events in chapter 26 all take place on Saturday through Thursday. Chapter 27 takes place on what we call Good Friday. Chapter 28 chronicles Easter Sunday, the day of the Resurrection. This study will investigate the deity, majesty, and royalty of Jesus. We will see that he is more than a man or a good teacher, that he is able to conquer death, and that he is truly the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

Our other adult class which meets in the Luther Hall Lounge will be using a study called:

Matthew: His Kingdom Forever

The apostle Matthew writes his gospel to proclaim to the world that its promised Savior has come. Pointing to Jesus as the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies, Matthew proclaims the universality of Jesus’ love. Matthew shows Jesus as the king who

- lives today after suffering, dying, and rising again to save us;
- gives life, salvation, comfort, and hope;
- desires everyone as a member of His kingdom;
- invites us to trust in Him as we live as His people.

By inspiration of the Holy Spirit, Matthew’s account tells us about Jesus Christ, the Son of God, ruler of the universe, and our personal Savior and friend.

Nursery Care with kid-friendly meal

The Christian Education Board would like to invite you, your family, friends, and the people in our community to a Passover Banquet. Passover is both a holiday of remembrance and a holiday of prophecy. Passover for the Jewish people is the annual celebration of God delivering Israel out of Egypt (Exodus 12). The entire service, with its various ceremonies, is designed to help the Jewish people remember the great workings of God when, through signs and wonders, He freed the Jewish people from the bondage of the Egyptians and delivered them to the promised land of Israel. Passover is a holiday of redemption picturing how God used the death of an innocent lamb to redeem the firstborn sons of Israel from death and free the nation of Israel from slavery.



Passover is certainly the most important Biblical holiday for Christians. It also clearly pictures the redemption Jesus provided for our sin. The last meal Jesus ate with His disciples in the Upper Room was a Passover meal. It was during this Passover meal that Jesus took a piece of unleavened bread and a cup of the fruit of the vine and said to His disciples that these represented His Body given in death and His blood shed for the remission of sins (Luke 22:19,20). The Messiah used the story of the redemption from Egypt to illustrate the

redemption Jesus provided for us on the cross.

On March 8, Neal Surasky from Chosen People Ministries will lead us in an authentic Jewish Passover meal. Neal, born in Oceanside, New York and raised in a secular Jewish home, would later accept Jesus as his Jewish Messiah and now serves along with his wife, Kim teaching others about Jesus through the traditional Jewish liturgy and worship. This banquet will help all who participate gain a greater understanding of the Jewish heritage and customs that shape the Biblical story and highlight the unique way that Jesus Christ used the Passover meal to show how His ministry fulfills the expectations of the Messiah put forth by this meal.

We will need several people to help make this event a great success as we look for people to help with cooking, serving, housing for Neal, publicity, and more. If you'd like to be involved, please contact Pastor Jim or Linda McFadden for more information on how you can help others experience the Messiah in the Passover.

Please, plan on attending this banquet, where we will take part in the actual Passover and we can rejoice "For Christ our Passover lamb has been sacrificed for us" (1 Corinthians 5:7).

Working at Hotel Pichi Traful



Steve and Stuart patched and painted all the bathrooms in the hotel, more than ten.



Tina, Kearstin, and the other chicas had mountains of ironing to do.



When they weren't ironing, the girls striped and resealed all the floors in the hotel and cabins. They placed steel wool under their shoes and rubbed it to strip off the grime.



Always a cheerful worker! Provided he remembered to charge up his MP3 player so he could listen to his tunes.



When we arrived, this was a hole in the ground. It was the septic drain field. They filled it with rocks and then covered it with dirt and made this beautiful flower bed. The flowers should be well fertilized!



Steve was able to share from the Word one Sunday. We had a devotional time each Sunday evening. Singing, sharing, praying, and a message. Jaime translated for me. Not fluent, yet.



Stuart began a towel fight one evening while doing the dishes... but as you can see, the girls ended it.



This was our home while we were in Pichi. This building had twelve bedrooms and ten bathrooms. Enough beds for fifty people.



Dear Friends and Family,

Thursday we arrived back "home" in Monte. Our month in the south is finished and summer camps begin here at the Bible Institute next week.

I apologize for our lack of communication during December, but I thought that might happen. We could only use their two computers, and only during a few hours in the evenings. And there were 20 people wanting to use them. So... our time on the internet was very limited. And since all your email addresses are on my laptop, I couldn't contact most of you. But, now we are back in Monte and we have more access to the web.

The month passed very quickly for us. It seemed that all we did was work, eat, and sleep. A typical day was breakfast at 8:30, short devotional time, work until lunch at 1:00, rest for a couple of hours, work again until 7:00 or 8:00, supper at 8:00, shower and then bed. Lights out at 11:00. Literally lights out, because they shut off the generator until after breakfast the next morning. Our days off (about three of them) were spent hiking and/or resting. Christmas day we hiked 14 km to some beautiful waterfalls, and New Years day they (not Tina and I) hiked to the top of one of the mountains. See the attached picture of Stuart at the top. Yes, he took that one himself. The other picture was taken from one of the upstairs windows in the hotel. The snow capped peaks in the center was where they hiked. They began their trek around 11 am and about 7 pm we could see them (with binoculars) crossing a big patch of snow at the top. Even with the binoculars they looked like little specs. They made it back after 10 pm. The next day we started the 20 hour bus ride back here.



Pray for the people who will be coming to Pichi Trafal this summer. It is a hotel/lodge where tourists can stay, but they also have week long programs similar to summer camp. Each year many young people, and tourists, come to know Jesus Christ as their Savior while they stay at the hotel, and many who are already believers make important decisions about serving God with their whole heart and lives. Even though we won't be involved in those decisions directly, we had a small part in it by helping to prepare the hotel and property for the summer.

In a day or so, I will send you an email I had tried to send right after we had arrived at Pichi Trafal. I will send more later, with lots of pictures.

Pray for the summer camp season here in Argentina. There are seven weeks of camps here with up to 800 campers per week. And this year they are having a second camp in the north in Cordoba. We will be working as camp staff for a few hours each day, as well as continuing our Spanish classes. Pray for the campers to be open to God's working in their lives, and for the staff to be sensitive to their needs.




PHILLIP JR. AND MARCEIL HAMMERSTROM SCHOLARSHIP FUND


