# The Day of Cosmic Justice

For in [Jesus] all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him, God was pleased to reconcile to Himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of the cross. Colossians 1:19-20

Get out your red and blue pens and put a big, colorful circle around February 5. Not only is it Super Bowl Sunday, it is the Day of Cosmic Justice.

With the New England Patriots victorious and our football hero Tom Brady (the greatest QB of all time) named MVP, NFL commissioner Roger Goodell will be compelled to award the championship trophy, tributes and kudos to Belichik, Brady and the Patriot team and throng. As he presents the Lombardi Trophy, at that moment, justice will be served. Goodell's Machiavellian machinations to deny this triumph will be put to naught. His bogus, vindictive conflagration of "Deflate-gate" and Brady's four-game suspension will be proven petty, feeble and ineffectual. Goodell should exchange the trophy for a big plate of juicy crow. Or, in this case, falcon.

So, how do I really feel? Don't ask.

Though our man Brady could smirk, sneer and offer some choice words to the commissioner, I'm pretty sure he will not. He will be his usual gracious self. He'll be the gentleman we expect him to be. Justice is served and that's enough.

Though a Patriot victory with Brady accolades may offer a moment of joy and jubilation, in the grand scheme of things, the justice served is but for a few and for a time and a season. After all the Monday morning quarterbacking, it will be relegated to the annals of football history. It wasn't all that cosmic after all.

There is only one instance of cosmic justice which is for all people, of all times and of all places. You won't ever find it on a football field or any other place but one. You find it at the cross of Jesus.

The verses of Colossians 1:19-20 are among my most favorite in Scripture. They remind us that because Jesus gave himself, body and blood, on the cross, God has fully and completely reconciled Himself to us. All sins are forgiven. All debt is paid. All shame is put away. Now when God sees us, God sees us as good. God is pleased to love us and call us His own. This is true and eternal Cosmic Justice.

When God created the heavens and the earth and everything in them, God exclaimed, "It is good! It is very good!" But when our sin corrupted creation and everything in it, all that goodness was desecrated. Only Jesus Christ, the sinless Son of God, could restore it and reconcile us to our Creator and Father.

"It is finished," Jesus cried. That was the moment of universal victory over all our darkness, sin and death. That was the moment of Cosmic Justice.

Since You Asked

# Since You Asked...

I was recently skimming the list of Sundays and Principle Festivals in the ELW hymnal and noticed St. Valentine was not listed for February 14. Instead there was Cyril, monk and Methodius, bishop. Why is St. Valentine not listed and those other two are? I've never heard of them.

Hmmm. Interesting.

St. Valentine is no longer listed on the Roman Catholic, Episcopal or Lutheran festival calendars. He is considered more Christian legend than actual person. His story, as intriguing as it is, cannot be verified to any good degree of historical satisfaction. (By the way, the same thing happened to St. Christopher.)

Saints Cyril and Methodius were 9<sup>th</sup> century Greek brothers and theologians. They were sent by the Byzantine (Eastern Orthodox) Church to serve as missionaries to Moravia, Croatia and other Slavic peoples. St. Cyril is acclaimed as the developer of the Cyrillic Alphabet which is used in Russia and several Slavic nations still today. Together, the brothers translated the Gospels and Holy Liturgy into the Slavonic language. It was one of the first liturgies to be offered to the people in their own language. Methodius continued translating other New Testament books and the works of the "Church Fathers" after his brother's death. The brothers are highly revered in both Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches in Eastern Europe.

# The Cross and the Carpenter

Our midweek evening Lenten worship services begin **Ash Wednesday**, March 1, at 6:45 in the sanctuary. The service will include the Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion. The Wednesday evening services continue through April 5. A Soup and Sandwich Supper precedes these services at 5:30 p.m. in Luther Hall.

Our Lenten theme this year is *The Cross and the Carpenter*. Each Wednesday a guest woodworker will share how his talent and skills relate to the life and ministry of the boy-carpenter Jesus who makes his way from a wooden trough in Bethlehem to the wooden cross of Calvary.


# Knowing Jesus. Showing Jesus. Celebrating Grace Congregational Life Ministries

#### **GROCERY BAG MINISTRY**

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In December, we distributed 142 bags, and have already distributed 115 in January. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. **Grocery size** paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


