Less Slop, More Joe

As if with choice meat you satisfy my soul. My mouth joyfully praises you. Psalm 63:5 (NET)

At a small holiday dinner for some of my closest friends, our featured dish is not turkey, ham or beef Wellington. It's sloppy joes! It has become our tradition. And, I'm entrusted to provide this culinary gift.

My friend who cannot cook brings the buns, chips & dip and beverages. He's really bad in the kitchen. (How bad is he?) He's so bad that when he purchased a set of Rachel Ray cookware; she cried and tried to buy it back.

Another friend brings a jumbo shrimp cocktail. He orders it and has it made at Firestone Country Club. (No, he does not golf. He just lives there.) The last member of the group provides a homemade dessert. It is usually a delectable cheesecake or a delicious cake roll. Once he made a chocolate-chocolate crème cake roll that is still one of my favorite holiday memories.

I make the sloppy joes along with some kind of potato or pasta salad. It's tradition.

First, my sloppy joes look like Christmas because I start out with **red** pepper, **green** pepper and **white** onion. I sauté these with a good pound and a half or more of 85-90% lean ground beef. This makes my sloppy joes hearty, meaty and tasty. They won't run all over the place like chili-on-a-bun. I've got this down to a culinary art. It's a matter of less slop and more joe!

Though the Bible does not mention sloppy joes, it does tell us we need to "feed on God's word." As Jesus reminds us, "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." We maintain and improve our spiritual health through reading, studying and reflecting on Scripture.

As we mature in our faith, our diet changes. As St. Paul teaches the Christians in Corinth, we start out with spiritual milk. This may include our first Bible stories and basic, core beliefs. As we grow in God's grace, we are ready for and feast on heartier fare. Our spiritual appetite craves greater knowledge, deeper understanding, and higher wisdom. There's a lot to chew on.

As we make our way through the New Year, may we all take time to feast of God's word. Let us daily finds ways to "taste and see that the Lord is good." The most wonderful delights are there to fully satisfy our hungry souls. Amen.

Since You Asked...

Since You Asked...

When the Bible says John the Baptist ate *locusts*, does that mean he ate bugs? I've heard different interpretations of the word. What do you think?

In the Gospel of St. Mark 1: 6, we read, "Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey."

John the Baptist's diet has always been a topic of discussion and debate. In some circles, locusts is interpreted as referring not to the insect, but to the seed pods of the carob tree. The two words are very similar in Aramaic, the spoken language of Jesus.

I am convinced the passage refers to insects. Yes! John the Baptist ate bugs!

Locusts are mentioned 22 other times in the Bible and all other references clearly refer to insects. Locusts are commonly eaten in Arabia and some other Middle Eastern countries. Eaten either raw or roasted they are said to be quite nutritious and the source of many vitamins. (I've neither read nor heard about how they taste, nor am I eager to find out.)

While most insects were considered "unclean" and forbidden as food under Mosaic Law, locusts were an exception. Leviticus 11:22 states locusts, crickets and grasshoppers were an acceptable dietary choice.

Though we may not be comfortable with the aesthetics of John's meals, he ate bugs. Thank God we have many other options!

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In Nov., we distributed 128 bags, and have already distributed 107 in December. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.
