(Warning: The following article contains bathroom humor.)

There are few things more frustrating than searching for toilet paper in time of need or more exasperating than having it available but out of reach. To remedy this bathroom dilemma, I have 2-3 rolls easily and accessibly reserved in a planter I have reconfigured as a toilet paper holder.

It is said, "The only constant in this world is change." How very true. Some change is greatly needed and wonderfully beneficial. Some change, of course, is not.

Since You Asked...

Since You Asked...

What is a sanctuary lamp? Do we have one?

A "sanctuary lamp" is also known as an eternal light or eternal flame. Ours hangs above the center of the chancel in the sanctuary. It represents God's constant and abiding presence with us. The light reminds us of Jesus' words, "Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them."

Most Lutheran churches have sanctuary lamps which are usually suspended from the ceiling by a chain over the altar area. Another variant is to have a lamp attached to the sanctuary wall behind or on either side of the altar.

The history surrounding the use of these lamps is difficult to determine. Often the origins are linked to references in the Old Testament. God gave directions for the building of the tabernacle that included a lamp stand (Exodus 25:31-40) and told the Israelites to have oil burning lamps in the meeting tent "from evening to morning" as a perpetual ordinance (Exodus 27:20-21).

Hammerstrom Scholarship

Grace, Dover Awards Scholarships



Ten local college students received awards totaling \$47,500 from the Hammerstrom Scholarship Fund. The fund is administered by Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in Dover. Two more students were awarded \$1000 each to continue their studies from the congregation's Professional Ministry Scholarship fund.

The Hammerstrom Scholarship Fund was established to assist college students pursuing degrees in the medical field or engineering. Trade school educational assistance is also acceptable for consideration. First preference is given to active members of Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Nine students received \$5000 one-year scholarships.

Olivia Bauer and **Madeline Bauer**, daughters of Erick and Molly Bauer of Dover, both are enrolled at The Ohio State University. Olivia is pursuing a career in health Communications. Madeline will be studying occupational and music therapies.

Joshua Fisher, son of Rhonda Fisher of Strasburg and Paul Fisher of Canton, will be attending Akron University. He is working on a degree in mechanical and electrical engineering with his sights on work in the automotive industry.

Erika Homrighausen of Dover is a nursing student at the Tuscarawas Branch of Kent State University. She plans to specialize in medical-surgical nursing.

Jana Keller, daughter of Jeffrey and Pamela Keller of Dover, attends Otterbein University studying to become a family nurse practitioner.

Kristin Miceli and **Anthony Miceli** are the daughter and son of Jim and Audra Miceli of Dover. Kristin is working on her nursing degree at Kent State University. Anthony plans to become a firefighter and paramedic. He is enrolled at Stark State University.



They'll Be Comin' 'Round the Mountain



GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In May, we distributed 129 bags, and have already distributed 111 in June. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.




