What does it mean to be "Saved"

Recently I completed a book entitled "Jesus Wants to Save Christians" by Rob Bell and Don Colden. The title, as usual, captured my attention, but the premise of the book I must say has truly opened my heart to new possibilities for being a Christian and for us together being the church. The book re-reads all of the Bible through the lens of the Exodus story, seeing again and again the pattern in which God's people are called into relationship with God, grow into prominence in the world, abandon our attention to God's way to seek our own way of living, and then are rescued from the oppression our own way has led us into by a God who eternally listens to the cry of the oppressed. There is a way in which we as human beings get caught up in the practice of building empires of our own that seek to control, dominate, and accumulate wealth for ourselves but this is not God's way. The book, rightfully I would argue, points out the many ways that we as Christians, we the Church have all too often adopted this same way of empire, dominance, and accumulation for ourselves too. But there is a different way that Jesus invites us to. There is a different life that Jesus makes available to all, and he gives it to us in the way it will be demanded of us - he gives it to us with his life on the cross. Jesus becomes for us the Passover lamb whose blood sets us free from the death that surrounds us in this world. Jesus blood on the cross rescues us from sin, death and the power of the devil so that we are freed to live in a new way, no longer dominated by greed, lust, and power, but led by the Spirit of God as seen most clearly in the life of Jesus Christ. Jesus' life invites us to see that power is most powerful when it is used to bring freedom and wealth is only wealth when it produces something that lasts, and security is not found in being bigger than those around us but in living in ways that honor the dignity and value of all people, even our enemies.

As Lutheran Christians, our first question is always "What does this mean?" and that is the question I have been asking of myself and our community. What does it mean that we are a church who bears the name of Christ in this community? How do we participate in the way of Christ that gives life to others? Certainly we serve those who are in need but have we begun to look for ways to break the cycle of poverty and

WORSHIP SERIES

Covenant: Sundays in Lent

Throughout the Sundays of Lent we will be looking at the word Covenant. Covenant means to cut a deal, to make an agreement. Throughout the Hebrew Bible God continues to make covenants with the people. Each of these covenants promises the presence of God with them and for them and each also carries an expectation that the people will live in ways that God establishes for them to be a Holy people - a people that are set apart for

God's purposes. We find echoes of this covenant relationship in the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion as we give thanks for the promise of God's grace, mercy, and life that come to us through them and the expectation of our response to that great gift that calls us to live in ways that honor the God who has saved us with His body and blood.

March 1 : Noah & the Flood - Genesis 9:8-17

March 8 : Abraham & Sarah - Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

March 15 : The Sinai Covenant - Exodus 20:1-17

March 22 : The Serpent & the Staff - Numbers 21:4-9

March 29 : Jeremiah & the New Covenant - Jeremiah 31:31-34

For those interested in diving deeper into a way of life that feeds this way of life we will offer a course on understanding and practicing the Spiritual Disciplines in your life as we work through the course, "The Life You've Always Wanted" in our adult forum March 1-April 5.

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday is all about making an entrance. We wave palm branches and sing "Hosanna." Some congregations have big processions in their neighborhoods and through their church buildings. But this Sunday is not just about entrances; it is also the Sunday of the Passion, when we tell the story of what happens after Jesus gets to Jerusalem. There is more to this story. Jesus didn't just go to Jerusalem. Jesus was arrested, tortured, crucified, and buried in Jerusalem. For this reason the focus of Palm/Passion Sunday's readings are not on entrance but on emptying. Jesus "emptied himself...and became obedient to the point of death - even death on a cross." (Phil. 2:7-8) We do not just enter Holy Week on this Sunday; we are drawn into it.

We invite you to join us for a unique time of worship that will highlight this movement from triumphant entrance to the obedience of emptying oneself for the sake of the world. We will gather for worship on this Sunday, April 5 in Youth Hall and process with palms into the sanctuary at the beginning of the service. If you cannot process with us due to health issues you may spend this time in prayer in the sanctuary.

PLANNING COUNCIL

Catching up with Council

Hello! I thought it would be a good idea to try and write an article to help bridge the gap between our Planning Council and Members. I will try to address and answer questions submitted by members and myself and discuss some of the upcoming events and ideas Planning Council has been discussing.

How do I find out who is on a particular Church Committee?

The easiest thing to do is to call the church office and ask for the secretary who can provide you with the members on each committee and on Planning Council. Rosters are also printed in the messenger from time to time. For convenience we have provided a roster of all Planning Council Members and Committee Members in this messenger.

If one of my family members are sick, how do I ensure they are listed in the bulletin and are being prayed for on Sundays?

The bulletin inserts are prepared by the church secretary and Pastor on a weekly basis, so you should call the Church Office and provide the name of the individual. They can then put the name in the bulletin. Also, if you would like Pastor to visit your family member you should provide the Church Office with the name and location of the individual (hospital, room number, etc...). In today's society, medical information is not released and Pastor is not always informed when a member is in the hospital, so a phone call is necessary.

Is it true that there is an opening to chair the Fellowship Board?

Yes this is true. Planning Council is looking for a devoted individual to lead our Fellowship Board. The Fellowship Board is in charge of bringing our members together outside of Sunday worship. The Fellowship Board also helps plan the annual Church Picnic with the assistance of the rest of the Ministry Boards. If you think you have the gifts to chair the Fellowship Board or would like more information about this opportunity please let Pastor or myself know.

I have been thinking of serving as the Cherub Choir Director, but am hesitant to get involved?

You should not be hesitant. The Cherub Choir Director is in charge of having weekly rehearsals with our youngsters between October and April. Rehearsals are usually 45 minutes to 1hour in length and are held at a date and time convenient for all involved. The Cherub Choir generally tries to hold one performance per month between October and April. The ideal attributes for this job include a passion for music and a love for children. If you think you have the gifts to lead our youngsters in this area give myself or Pastor a call.

Has Planning Council discussed obtaining an AED for the Church or possibly training our members in CPR to provide a safer place to worship on Sundays?

Yes. After your question the Planning Council discussed investigating options to make Grace the safest place to worship on Sundays. As part of our investigation, Planning Council is trying to determine how many members would be interested in CPR training. If you are interested in being trained by a licensed CPR instructor please leave your name and contact information with the church office. Once we determine the level of interest in our Congregation, Planning Council will make a decision on how best to proceed. Also, please provide me with your thoughts or concerns on obtaining an AED for our Church. Feel free to email me or leave a note in my mail box with your thoughts.

Are there any upcoming programs to keep our congregation strong?

Yes. Our Synod puts on a seminar entitled Healthy Congregations. The seminar advises about the good and bad behaviors in a congregation and teaches congregations about how to maintain a healthy atmosphere for worship and fellowship. Planning Council is considering hosting this seminar at Grace. Congregations from all over our Synod would be invited to attend as well as our own members. To host the seminar Grace will need to provide a lunch to all attendees. If you are interested in supporting this program, please contact myself or Pastor.

EVANGELISM BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 2008

2008 was another busy year for the Evangelism Board as it sought to coordinate the congregation's role in spreading the word of God through deeds of kindness, caring and compassion. Food was prepared and served, cards were sent, visitors were greeted, and monetary support was given to a family as it prepared for the mission field.

One of the most visible programs of the Board is coordinating the free lunch for the needy, which is served at the Outreach Center on the third Wednesday of each month. Every month, a team of five church members serve (and clean up!) the food that was donated. Many people prepare the soups, salads, desserts, and casseroles for this lunch.

Another way we serve the hungry is to provide a meal on the fourth Sunday of each month at the Homeless Shelter in New Philadelphia. Our goal is to provide a complete meal for 48 people who cal the shelter their temporary home. Janice Weber is now coordinating these meals and making sure that enough food donations are pledged.

Our Grocery Bag ministry team packs grocery bags to distribute to those who need some food to carry them over difficult times. The congregation generously donates canned and boxed food to the food pantry every Sunday. Bob McCullough has been instrumental in coordinating the items in the pantry and making sure that there were people to pack the bags. Dorothy Morrison became the shopper for the pantry to fill in items that were running low.

Every Sunday at Grace we lift up several members in prayer. This is an opportunity for the entire body of Christ to pray for the members of their church family throughout the week. Michelle Hallman prepares the list for each Sunday and informs the members by letter that they will be uplifted in prayer that week.

So many of you have been touched by the cards that Patti Stull faithfully sends to members of our congregation when they are going through difficult times or celebrating God's blessings. Janice Weber mails seasonal greetings to our homebound members as a way to stay in touch with those who are still an important part of our church family, but who can't make it to services on a regular basis.

The members of Grace have been faithful in supporting through prayer and through financial gifts the Moser family as they prepare for entering full-time mission work in El Salvador. They will begin their work in January 2009.

The current board tried to maintain the high goals of the previous one, headed by Jen McCullough. Please pray for us as we evaluate ways to further involve all members of Grace in spreading God's word to our neighbors.

Oil Lamps, Lanterns, Rechargeable Lamps


Beads and Old Beaded Jewelry - to be used in a bead shop in the Marketplace
