CATCHING UP WITH COUNCIL

Dear Congregation,

In October, Planning Council reviewed and approved the 2010 budget. The final budget will be submitted to the Congregation at the Annual Meeting on November 15, 2009 10:00 a.m.

The financial outlook for 2010 was brightened by the receipt of funds from the Marian Lewis Revocable Trust ("Trust"). In September, Planning Council received a check for \$22,500 made payable to our Church. It is anticipated that we will receive a gift of \$90,000 annually from the Trust. The gift will be made in quarterly installments and represents payments of one third of the income from the Trust. The remaining two thirds of the Trust income will be divided among First United Church of Christ and the Tuscarawas County University Foundation. The Trust funds are managed by the Huntington National Bank. Proceeds of the Trust will be deposited into a separate checking account for our Church entitled The Brinley R. Lewis Memorial Fund. The funds are to be used for additions, maintenance and repairs to the Church building.

Did you know Marian and Brinley Lewis?

Marian Lewis passed away on September 11, 2008. Her husband, Dr. Brinley Lewis passed away in 1988. The couple were married for 55 years. Dr. Lewis was a naval dental officer in WWII and practiced for over 48 years. He was a Board Member of the AAA, the Board of Health, YMCA, the Union Country Club and the Reeves Banking and Trust. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge, American Legion and Tadmor Shrine. He was a lifetime member of Dover Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church and also was a graduate of Wittenberg University where he played football and baseball.

Marian was born in New Philadelphia and was the daughter of Fred and Emma Strine. She graduated from Oberlin University and taught school in the New Philadelphia and Alliance Schools. She assisted her husband in his practice and volunteered at the General Health Department in Dover and was a lifetime member of First United Church of Christ in New Philadelphia. It is my understanding that there are no descendants of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis.

Marian outlived her husband by 20 years and was not a member of our Church, yet she still desired to honor her late husband's wishes in her Trust and made sure our Church received one-third of the annual income of her Trust. It is my understanding that Marian scrupulously saved and invested her money to ensure that it was maximized for the benefit of her charitable beneficiaries. As you can imagine, it takes a significant amount of money to generate \$270,000 in annual income. The last few years of her life, Marian Lewis was not purchasing extravagant jewelry, going on luxury cruises or building a mansion. Rather, she remained in her ordinary yellow home on East Iron Avenue (with the wheelchair ramp), ironically 5 houses up from Pastor Jim. In fact, Marian Lewis could not even use the upstairs of her home during the last few years of life and lived exclusively on the first floor.

I have spoken with many individuals from the Congregation who did not know who Marian Lewis was or whether she even went to our church. I don't recall seeing her name on our prayer list over the years or on our shut in list. In fact, I don't know if our Church had any contact with Marian in the last few years. All I do know is that Marian continued to save and lived an ordinary life in an effort to benefit our Church. Marian Lewis did not ask anything from us. Yet, she gave one third of her entire life savings to our Church. This alone is a significant gift, but when your life spans 102 years like Marian's, it is simply extraordinary. In sum, Marian Lewis' gift to our Church is truly a Christ like gift.

This story brings up the inevitable question, when was your last Christ like gift? It doesn't have to be a gift of money, it can be a gift of time, food, assistance, or prayer. A Christ like gift is simply a selfless desire to help others, without any expectation of return or benefit.

Each time you take a drive down East Iron Avenue, look for the yellow home several doors up from Pastor Jim's old house, and say a little thank you to Marian and Brinley Lewis. They have done so much for us without asking, let us do the same.

Special thanks to Jo Ann Hammond for the background information on Marian and Brinley Lewis.

On a separate note, the Call Committee also had the opportunity to meet on October 27, with Judy Hoshek of the Bishop's Office. Please ensure you keep the Call Committee in your prayers as they continue to move forward in the selection of our next pastor. For those of you having input or desire to provide input to the Call Committee, a list of names and contact information for the Call Committee can be found outside the Church Office. Please ensure you follow-up with a representative of the Call Committee as input and direction from all members of Grace is important in the next selection of our pastor.





Word of Life Fellowship, Inc. Giving to Missionaries

Many of you include missionaries in your giving practices at Christmastime, birthdays, anniversaries, etc. Sometimes questions arise as to how to send cards, letters, packages and personal monetary gifts. We would like to make the following suggestions.

Cards and letters should be sent directly to the missionaries. If mailing to overseas missionaries
during the Christmas holiday season, you should send at least 4-6 weeks prior to the desired date
of arrival. If you need to know the field address of a missionary, please contact Word of Life
Fellowship in Schroon Lake.

If you plan to send a parcel to an overseas missionary and are not familiar with customs policies of the country involved, we suggest you contact the missionary first to inquire concerning such policies. The missionary could be subject to customs fees for receiving the package.

- 2. Money sent to missionaries fall into two categories for tax purposes-donations for ministry support and personal gifts. The intention of the donor is important to distinguish between the two.
 - a. A tax-deductible donation for ministry support purposes should be made payable to Word of Life Fellowship, Inc. This will be applied to the designated missionary's support account and you will receive a tax-deductible receipt.
 - b. You may send your personal monetary gift to Word of Fellowship in Schroon Lake with a note indicating this is a personal gift and we will notify then of your gift. You will not receive a tax-deductible receipt for a personal gift.

H1N1- What You Need to Know

H1N1 –WHAT WE NEED TO KNOW -WHAT WE NEED TO DO

"H1N1" is the original name -"Swine Flu" is also the name given to a new strain or flu that has spread nationwide. A vaccine has been developed, tested, and is ready for distribution. However, supplies are limited. Health officials are now focusing on getting the vaccine to the most vulnerable in the population first. The following information was provided by various government public health agencies.

• How does H1N1 differ from ordinary flu? (seasonal flu)

This is a new strain of flu, unrecognized by most of our immune systems, making us more vulnerable to infection. So far, symptoms have not been particularly severe, nor has the strain been especially deadly. It was initially called swine flu because many genes in the virus were similar to those found in the viruses that normally occur in pigs. **There is no risk of infection from eating pork**.

• How do I avoid getting sick?

Once the H1N1 vaccine arrives, get vaccinated when public health experts advise. Flu spreads from person to person through coughing or sneezing. Sometimes People become infected by touching something that is contaminated. You can help reduce the risk of infection by washing your hands frequently, avoiding touching your eyes, nose and mouth and avoiding close contact with sick people.

• How do I tell the difference between flu and a cold?

It can be difficult to tell based on symptoms alone. In general, the flu is worse than the common cold and symptoms such as fever, body aches, extreme tiredness and dry cough are more common and intense. People with colds are more likely to have a runny or stuffy nose and less likely to have a fever.

• What should I do if I am sick?

Stay home and avoid contact with other people, except to get medical care. Anyone concerned about their illness should consult a healthcare provider, but those with the following conditions are at particular risk: cancer, blood disorders, chronic lung disease, diabetes, heart disease, kidney disorders, liver disorders, neurological disorders and weakened immune systems.

• What medicine can I take? Are there medicines that are unsafe?

The antiviral medications Tamiflu and Relenza can be helpful, but most people do not need to take them to recover from flu. Because of fears that there won't be enough for those who need them most, the CDC is advising doctors to be judicious when proscribing antivirals and to focus on hospitalized patients or those at increased risk of complications. Some over the counter medications can be helpful in lowering fever and alleviating other symptoms, but any products containing aspirin should not be given to children or teenagers, who might develop a serious illness called Reye's Syndrome. Do not give over-the-counter cold medications to children younger than 4 without speaking to a doctor.

H1N1- What You Need to Know

• How do I know whether it's the H1N1 strain or just ordinary flu?

You probably won't. Most of us won't have laboratory testing done to confirm flu type now that H1N1 is well-established within the U.S. Most of the flu circulation now is believed to be H1N1 because ordinary seasonal strains typically arrive later in the season.

• How do I know whether I should go to the hospital or take my child to the hospital?

Emergency warning signs in children include fast breathing or trouble breathing; bluish skin color; not drinking enough fluids; not waking up or interacting; a child so irritable that he or she does not want to be held; flulike symptoms improve then return with fever and a worse cough; fever with a rash.

Emergency signs in adults include difficulty breathing or shortness of breath; pain or pressure in the chest or abdomen; sudden dizziness; confusion; severe or persistent vomiting.

You should not go to the emergency department with mild flulike illness. Going there might expose you to the virus if you don't already have it.

Do I need to get a regular flu shot or an H1N1 shot if I've already been sickened with flu?

Officials recommend vaccination with both even if you've already experienced flulike illness.

• Do I have to get vaccinated?

No. Vaccination is not mandated by the government.

Should I try to get infected now to avoid potentially more severe illness later?

No. The CDC says there is no way to predict what the outcome will be for an individual or those whom that individual might infect.

REMEMBER: "Clean your hands, cough in your sleeves, stay home if you're sick. If you do not have a thermometer at home, buy one so if/when you call your doctor, you can tell them your symptoms. This will help them to help you faster," said Dr. Julie E. Mangino, medical director of clinical epidemiology at Ohio State University Medical Center.




