A Stitch in Time

...A time to tear and a time to sew... Ecclesiastes 3:7a

A stitch in time? Make that five! Five stitches in my foot!

By now most of you have heard of my little accident and the resulting "foot trauma." If you haven't, here's a much abridged version.

As I stepped out the front door to retrieve the Saturday morning newspaper, Quincy got loose and made a run for it. As I chased after him, I stumbled, fell and somehow cut my right foot. Meanwhile, Quincy heads back indoors as if nothing happened.

As I sat on the couch catching my breath, I noticed a spreading mess on the floor; took a look at the cut; was taken to the emergency room; and received five stitches. The attending nurse practitioner (NP) told me to stay off my foot for 48 hour. This meant missing Sunday morning services and Monday at the office. (Thank you, Pastor Eilert for filling in for me on such short notice. The congregation and I really appreciate it!)

When I went to visit my own doctor for a follow-up, after assuring me my foot was healing really well, his nurse practitioner noted the careful skill and fine work on my stitches. She remarked she had seen some really poor craftsmanship and this work on my foot was excellent. (Who knew I was walking on a work of art?)

As I thought about the NP's remarks, I contemplated the many "small skills" that can make big differences--skills such as sewing and stitching. Then I remembered Lauren Samsa telling us about her experience at the brain trauma center during the recent Grace Youth Mission Trip to Virginia.

Lauren related how she sewed cat toys for the residents. Sewing was a skill she learned from her grandmother and one she taught to group leader Ashley Jerles. It was a small skill, a small gift; but it meant so much and brought so much joy to the residents at the health care center.

God blesses each and every one of us with many wonderful gifts, skills, abilities and aptitudes. God gives them to us for a reason. God gives them to us to share; to touch the lives of others as expressions of His love; and to make a difference in big ways and small.

I have to confess, sewing and stitching is not one of my proficiencies. I can sew on a button and that's about it. But, I've grown in my appreciation of sewers, "stitchers" and menders and I thank God for them. A stitch in time, or five of them, can be a real blessing. Amen.



Since You Asked



[A few Sundays ago,] you referenced Scripture which you cited as one of your favorite passages and said, "If we were in Confirmation Class, I'd have you take out your highlighters and have you highlight this passage in your Bibles." I forgot the reference. Could you tell us again? I just may highlight it in my Bible. Thank you.

Funny you should mention this. Just this past Sunday (September 24), I had our Confirmation Class do just that. The passage is Isaiah 55: 10-11.

 ¹⁰ For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater,
¹¹ so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.

We are beginning our survey of the Holy Scriptures from Genesis through Revelation. This passage reminds us that God's Word is a "Means of Grace." It is active and activating. God reveals Himself and speaks to us through Scripture for a reason and with a purpose. What's more, God always accomplishes His purpose. God primary purpose is to create faith in our hearts and save us unto eternal life.

"Aren't Lutherans pretty much just like Roman Catholics?" No, they are not. "Aren't Lutherans just another Protestant church?" No. Not really. There are distinctions that make a real difference.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In August, we distributed 132 bags, and have already distributed 126 in September. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. <u>Grocery size</u> <u>paper bags are also needed.</u>

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


