# Since You Asked...

# When the "Trumpet Singers" began singing the "Hallelujah Chorus," the congregation immediately stood. What is the tradition behind this?

Theories abound, the most common being that King George II, attending the London premiere of Handel's "Messiah" in March of 1743, was so moved by the "Hallelujah" that he stood up - and if the king stands, everybody stands. Audiences have stood during this majestic anthem ever since.

The tradition made it intact to American shores, the Colonies naturally borrowing their cultural life from England. Benjamin Franklin is known to have attended a "Messiah" performance in Dublin in 1759, where he would have observed the custom. English professional musicians also would have brought such knowledge to America.

# Rev. Elizabeth Eaton Elected ELCA Presiding Bishop

August 14, 2013

PITTSBURGH - The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) **Northeastern Ohio Synod**, was elected Aug. 14 presiding bishop of the ELCA at the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. She was elected on the fifth ballot. There were 889 votes cast, and 445 votes were needed for an election. Eaton received 600 votes and the Rev. Mark S. Hanson, ELCA presiding bishop, received 287. Eaton is the ELCA's first woman presiding bishop-elect.

The churchwide assembly, the chief legislative authority of the ELCA, is meeting here Aug. 12-17 at the David L. Lawrence Convention Center. The theme for the triennial assembly is "Always being made new." This year marks the 25th anniversary of this Lutheran church denomination.

"We are a church that is overwhelmingly European in a culture that is increasingly pluralistic. We need to welcome the gifts of those who come from different places, that is a conversation we need to have as a church," Eaton told the assembly shortly after the election.

Prior to becoming synod bishop, Eaton served as pastor for ELCA congregations in Ohio. She earned a Master of Divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass., and a Bachelor's degree in music education from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio.


The lay reader is typically on a four-six week rotation. Thank you for your prayerful consideration.

#### **GROCERY BAG MINISTRY**

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In July, we distributed 105 bags, and have already distributed 102 in August. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most



urgently needed.





We at Grace have volunteered to provide one meal per month — the 4th Sunday of each month volunteers and need to provide the meal and to deliver it to the Friends of the of Tuscarawas **HOMELESS** Homeless County which is a group of



concerned citizens from various churches and social service agencies in the county who have recognized the need to assist persons experiencing homelessness. The residents eat dinner at 6:00 each evening. All tableware is provided by the shelter, and they ask that if we are just dropping the food off to bring it in disposable pans.

If you are unable to deliver your portion of the meal, please contact someone else who has signed up to deliver food.

Let's continue to work together as the body of Christ and serve our brothers and sisters in need.

#### PERSONAL CARE KITS AND SCHOOL KITS

Two of our Lutheran World Relief Projects are making Personal Care Kits and School Kits. These kits provide much needed supplies to many people around the world. Items that go into each kit are:

#### **Personal Care Kits**

1 light weight bath towel (dark color) 2 bath size bars of soap, 1 wide tooth comb 1 adult size toothbrush, 1 nail clipper with file

#### **School Kits**

4 - 70 sheet notebooks of ruled paper approx. 8 1/2" X 11"; do not include loose leaf paper

1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

1 30-centimeter ruler, or ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

1 pencil sharpener, 1 eraser approx. 2 1/2 "long

5 new, unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band

1 box of 16 or 24 crayons, 5 black or blue ball point pens - no gel ink; secure with a rubber band.

If you would like to provide any of the items used in these kits please drop them off at the church office and we will assemble them.


