Since You Asked

Since You Asked...

What is that light hanging down from the ceiling at the front of the sanctuary? A visiting family member asked me and I didn't know what to tell her.

That light is known as the **Eternal Light**. It may also be called the **Sanctuary Lamp** or **Eternal Flame**. It represents God's constant and abiding presence with us. The light reminds us of Jesus' words, "Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them." (Mathew 18:20) We also recall Jesus proclaiming, "I am the light of the world." (John 8:12)

Most Lutheran churches have sanctuary lamps which are usually suspended from the ceiling by a chain over the altar area. Another variant is to have a lamp attached to the sanctuary wall behind or on either side of the altar.

The history surrounding the use of these lamps is difficult to determine. Often the origins are linked to references in the Old Testament. God gave directions for the building of the tabernacle that included a lamp stand (Exodus 25:31-40) and told the Israelites to have oil burning lamps in the meeting tent "from evening to morning" as a perpetual ordinance (Exodus 27:20-21).

The Most Important Book You've Never Heard Of

How did the first Christians practice their faith? How did they live and worship? How did they function as a community of believers? **The Didache** gives us invaluable information and insight to these guestions and more.

The Didache simply means "The Teaching" and is often called "The Teaching of the Twelve Apostles." It is one of the earliest Christian documents, earlier than most writing of the New Testament. It is regarded as the first catechism of the church, providing direction for worship, church policy, community and personal behavior. The small, concise book highlights sayings of Jesus common to the Gospels of Matthew and Luke and shows how they are to be understood and practiced by his followers as "the way of life."



Hark! The Glad Bound

Peebles-Herzog, Inc., *The Pipe Organ Company* of Columbus, OH will begin the repair and refurbishment of our pipe organ in September. As of this writing, no firm start date has been set for the project. Updates and a specific timeline will be included in upcoming Sunday bulletin inserts.

It is expected the work will take three to four weeks. During that time, the organ will be unavailable for Sunday worship and other church services. Our concert piano and keyboard will be used instead.

The work includes repairs to the console, the positive organ wind regulator and the Great Organ pallet box. We have also agreed to shutdown the "solo organ" which was added to the original organ in 1987. It has proven to be more of a hindrance than a compliment to the original instrument and has additional repairs issues that are not worth the effort, according to Peebles-Herzog assessors.

We are thankful the repairs are an "off-budget" expense and will be paid through the Lewis Memorial Fund account. Grace Planning Council, as advised by Music Director Bobbie Myers, interim organist Beverly Frantz, Pastor Rice and the experts from Peebles-Herzog, approved the repairs and funding.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In July, we distributed 165 bags, and have already distributed 121 in August. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. **Grocery size** paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most


