Praise the Lord! Praise God in His sanctuary; praise Him in His mighty heavens! Praise Him with trumpet sounds; praise Him with lute and harp! Praise Him with tambourine and dance; praise Him with strings and pipe! Let everything that breathes praise the Lord! Psalm 150 (selected verses)

On my recent trip to New York's Hudson Valley, I visited West Point. It was there I received an unexpected and most astounding surprise. It was undoubtedly the highlight of my trip.

The first stop on the West Point tour was the Cadet Chapel. As my touring companions and I arrived, we were greeted by the resplendent sounds of the chapel's pipe organ playing the classic, majestic hymn "Crown Him with Many Crowns." It was a breath-taking, spine-tingling, goose-bumpy, jaw-dropping and ear-riveting rendition. Each of the hymn's six verses were played with different stops; each building to an incredible flourish before a resounding, robust final verse. It was a recital of praise and glory that I will never forget and gladly cherish.

The chapel organ at West Point is the largest **church organ** in the world! It has 213 ranks, 874 stops and 14,195 pipes! Wow! It something you have see and hear to believe.

By comparison, our wonderful organ here at Grace would seem to be a miniature instrument with a mere 52 ranks or about a quarter of the size of the West Point behemoth. (I'm unsure as to its number of stops and pipes, but there's sure lot of them.) Still, it is one of the largest pipe organs in the county and surely one of the best sounding. There's no doubt it enhances our worship experiences and prompts us to glorify to God with songs of praise, thanksgiving and faith.

We are not only blessed with an outstanding instrument but also an excellent organist, Linda Hanna, whose musical selections and talents wonderfully augment our worship services. She follows a long line of gifted organists including, most recently, Sally Riehl, Joe Palmer and Beverly Frantz. We owe them all a debt of gratitude for their melodious service.

Of course, like any fine instrument, keeping it tuned and in shape requires time, effort and money. As you may recall, last winter we completed a major overhaul of our Kuhn pipe organ by the highly reputed Peebles-Herzog Organ Company of Columbus. The work began with some of our men volunteering to carefully remove some of the pipes and gingerly carry them down from the gallery to the narthex and sanctuary. It was a six-week project of repair, renovation and refurbishment. But, it was completed in time to celebrate Palm Sunday with a splendid difference is musical qualities. Pipe dreams do come true, after all.

That was Phase I. This winter, we will resume our organ renovations with Phase II which will complete the project and include some technological updates and enhancements. All this work is being funded by monies from the Lewis Memorial Fund, specifically designated for capital improvements and major repairs. We are so very blessed to have the necessary resources to maintain our magnificent, God-glorifying pipe organ. Thanks be to God!

The next time you hear our pipe organ playing, open your ears to hear its beauty! Open your lips with songs of praise! And, open your heart with joy! Praise the Lord! Amen.

Since You Asked

Since You Asked ...

Hi, Pastor. We recently had guests for our worship service who asked me the meaning behind the things you use to uncover the bread and wine before Holy communion. The same three things are used again after Communion to cover them. Is there some symbolism there? Since there were three coverings, he suggested they represent Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Was he right?


Great question! Thank you.

I regret if I disappoint anyone, but there is no great theological, mystical or spiritual symbolism in the uncovering and re-covering of the Holy Communion elements of bread and wine. The three objects used are for practical purposes.

The white napkin-like cloth that covers the chalice (cup) is called the **purificator**. In former times, the priest/pastor used this cloth to wipe the rim of the cup as the wine was distributed from person to person. The practice was known as the common cup. The practice is largely discontinued.

The paten, which holds the host (the single, larger piece of bread) rests atop the chalice and purificator. The **pall** is the stiffened, white, square card that is set atop this. Its sole use is to keep dust and insects from falling into the Eucharistic elements.

The veil may be either white or the color of the season and covers all the afore-mentioned




God's grace certainly changes everything. While in Houston this summer, we all experienced the transformative power of a community of faith drawn together to share Christ's love and to do God's work.

GROCERY BAG MINISTRY

Thanks to all who have volunteered to be packers for the Grocery Bag Ministry this year.

Donations to the Food Pantry have increased in response to a greater need for our food bags. In July, we distributed 129 bags, and have already distributed 116 in August. We are seeing a greater demand for this outreach program. Monetary and food donations are very much appreciated.

What goes into a bag to feed the hungry? The basic food items are: peanut butter, canned meat, vegetables, fruit, cereal, soup, macaroni & cheese, canned white potatoes, spaghetti sauce and spaghetti noodles. We also pack a roll of toilet paper and a bar of soap when available.

We welcome all packaged/canned donations. We will pack any kind of soup, fruit, vegetable, soap or toilet paper that is donated, as well as extra items not on the list. Grocery size

paper bags are also needed.

Thank you to all who bring food in for the grocery bags that are filled each month. Look in the Sunday bulletins to see which items are most urgently needed.


